## Food Tray Airplanes By Don Oppliger











couldn't resist sending a "teaser" to the editors of this newsletter regarding one of my recent projects. The teaser included a one-liner about building a light weight (39 gram), indoor electric plane from discarded food trays and plastic sacks from Price Chopper. I also included a couple of non-descript photos.

This prompted the following response from the editors:

LOL...that's funny! But what's the real scoop on the plane...e.g., something your goofy newsletter editors could include in the upcoming edition without getting too creative?

What we mean is, without your input we just might say something like:

"Having spent all my retirement savings, I decided to start building planes from used food containers. I start by purchasing the least expensive cuts of chicken which already comes packaged on Styrofoam trays. By doing this, I was able to save enough money to buy that VM5i CNC machine to do the cutout work. All I have to do is stack a bunch of food trays (washed clean of any chicken feathers) into the CNC machine and then turn it loose. Four minutes later, I have a complete airplane! Wow! I can hardly wait to tackle this little piece of foam packing material that came with my Seiko watch."



Now's your chance to set the record straight! -ed-

Not wanting to leave neither the membership nor our newsletter editors in a lurch, here's the real skinny.

I first reduced some plans for a small 3 D plane. Then I used a combo of plastic plates and 3mm foam to make the big parts by hand cutting out everything with an x-Acto knife.

The plane has an 18" wing span, 20" fuse and weighs 39 grams complete with the electronics and battery.

For covering, I really did use a plastic bag from Price Chopper. A glue stick was used to seal it to the wings and to the fuselage.

For electronics, I used a micro receiver and the servos from a crashed indoor plane. It uses four channels with a servo for each aileron. The 5 amp ESC and single cell LiPo battery complete the airborne package.

It should fly great indoors and, if ever there is a "no wind " day, I'll even try flying it in the back yard!! Stay tuned!



#### Annual Meeting Minutes—Jan 3, 2018

#### I. Call to order

President Jerry Brown called to order the annual meeting of the 95th Street Group, AMA Club # 4274 at 7:01 P.M. on January 3, 2018 in Johnny's Tavern, 13131 Shawnee Mission Pkwy Shawnee, KS 66216. There were 26 members in attendance. The sign in sheet was being passed around for members to indicate their presence and to verify the contact information listed; primary phone number, secondary phone number (if any) and e-mail address for receiving club related e-mails. Jerry welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Jerry reported that it had been a rough spring at the field with the storm damage. He thanked everyone who volunteered extra time and effort to help with cleanup and repair.

The sprinkler system winter maintenance was completed in October. Jerry thanked Lauren Wenger for doing maintenance and repair for the mowers and other equipment.

Jerry also thanked Tony Stuckwisch for organizing the annual picnic. Jerry said Tony volunteered to organize this year's picnic as well. Jerry thanked Ed and Elaine Noulin for everything they do for the club. They publish the newsletter, help with club communications and organize the mowing teams.

Jerry thanked Craig Williams for the donation to the club from the sale of some of Jim Shoemakers RC collection. There was an error in last year's minutes concerning his generosity. An amended copy of the minutes was passed around for approval and acceptance.

#### II. Approval of minutes from last meeting

The minutes from last year's meeting had an error concerning Article VI: New Business about the donation. An amended copy of the minutes had been passed around at the beginning of the meeting.

A motion was made and passed to accept the amended minutes from the last meeting.



#### III. 2018 Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Bill Alexander read the treasurer's report for 2018.

Bill contacted the mowing service to find out how much extra it would cost for them to do the work the mowing teams are doing now. He reported it would be an extra \$15 every time they mowed. This would eliminate the need for mowing teams. The club is financially sound. At the current \$140 dues level, the club needs to maintain 45 members to cover expenses. When the trailer blew over last year, Bill added a Misc. line to the treasurers' report that it never had before.

There had been some suggestions to solicit donations from members, but with the club sound, it would be better to wait until extra funds were needed.

If maintenance is needed on the flight stands and tables, there should be money for the repairs. A suggestion was made to have a veteran by the material at Home Depot to get the discount.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to accept the treasures report.

#### IV. Old Business:

The shelter wall for the west side that was proposed last year was put on hold because of the storm damage. That project will be pursued this year.

Jerry asked if there was any more old business. There was none.

#### V. Safety Report

Rick Donley reported that the club had a good year for safety at the field for 2017. He reminded everyone to keep their airplanes pointed to the flying field when setting up and working on the tables. This will prevent any accidental starts from launching a plane into the pits and other people. Rick wants everyone to think "Safety First!" Rick reminded everyone not to fly over the gun club. We need to be good neighbors!

There are several members who can help with programing radios so that one of the radios switches can be set to lock the throttle.

#### VI. New Business

Jerry reminded everyone that FAA registration is back in effect. He rimed everyone to have their FAA number as well as their AMA number in their aircraft as per the AMA guidelines.

Jerry asked if anyone had anymore new business. There was no response. Jerry ended the new business discussion.

#### VII. 2018 Officer Election

Jerry Brown introduced this year's nominating committee. The current officers are willing to serve again if nominated and if voted in. There were no nominations from the floor or any volunteers.

A motion was made and seconded to elect the nominees as presented.

The motion passed.

#### VIII. New Members

A vote by ballot was held to approve the two probationary members, Phil Adams and Addison Oppliger, to full membership status.

Both members were approved for full member status.

#### IX. Work Day about Field Maintenance

There was a general discussion about field maintenance and Bills idea of paying the mowers extra to do

all the mowing and trimming. One idea was that 2-man teams might be able to get the work done so members would have fewer turns, but it was pointed out that 4-man teams can help cover for scheduling conflicts and other situations making sure the work gets done. It was suggested that if the club pays the extra for the mowing then the mowing teams could be eliminated.



A Motion was made, seconded and passed to accept the mowers offer to do the extra mowing and trimming and eliminate the mowing teams.

Work day was brought up and there was discussion about weed and crabgrass control. The sprinkler maintenance and flight stand maintenance was discussed.

#### X. Adjournment

President Jerry Brown addressed the club and asked if anyone had anything else for the meeting, no one did. He reminded everyone to make their check payable to 95th Street Group for \$140 and give them to Bill Alexander. It was agreed by acclamation that the meeting next year will be held, again, at Johnny's Tavern, 13131 Shawnee Mission Pkwy Shawnee, KS 66216.

At 7:56 P.M. a motion was made, seconded and passed to adjourn the meeting.

#### Clarence Lee—a Heads Up

If your been around R/C for any length of time, then you've likely heard talk about Veco and K&B engines. Heck, you might have even been lucky enough to own one of remarkable little pieces of fine engineering and craftsmanship! As you may already know, the person behind this remarkable line of engines is a person by the name of Clarence Lee.

Here is a brief summary of what the "Internet Craftsmanship Museum" has to say about Clarence and you're encouraged to read more at the museum's website:

"Clarence Lee started flying models and building his own engines in the late 1930's. He has designed several engines that have set records and won championships and ones that have seen a long production life made by companies like Veco and K&B. In recent years Clarence is probably best known for his customizing of engines for racing airplanes, cars and boats. Not only does he rework engines but he shares his expertise with those who want to do it themselves. He is a familiar face at flying fields, car tracks and boat ponds on the West Coast and is willing to assist anyone having engine problems. Besides his own innovations in model engine design, Clarence has kept abreast of engine development worldwide. He is also well informed on fuel, lubricants, tuned pipes, propellers and other areas related to model engines. He shares his knowledge in these areas in his column, "Engine Clinic" published each month in RC Modeler magazine since 1969. The Internet Craftsmanship Museum wishes to honor this unique combination of skills by letting you know a little more about Clarence Lee."

Lately, however, Clarence (age 95) appears to be struggling. Reading through the "forums" section at RC Group's website, you're liable to find the following post by "SROFlyer."



"In late August (2018—ed), I sent an OS FS91 head to Mr. Lee for exhaust port thread repair. I have been doing business with him since the 1960s and his turnaround has always been fast. After a month, I was worried that my head was lost in

the mail, as I was sure he had finished the repair and mailed it back. I called and talked to Mrs. Lee (what a sweet lady she is) and she said that "he is 95 and can't do things as fast as before" and that he had quite a backlog of work I explained to her that I was in absolutely no hurry but just worried that it was "lost in the mail".

Friday, Oct. 5th the head arrives - his usual gorgeous work. In with the head was an attached note. It turns out that he had had a fall and was recovering from a back injury. I know we all wish him a speedy and full recovery!

If you have something out to him for repair, it's probably best not to worry as it will get done.

Also, poor Mrs. Lee probably doesn't need any more phone inquiries either.
